For over 30 years, the Arab-American Family Support Center (AAFSC) has proudly served immigrant, refugee, and marginalized communities across New York.



# Letter from Leadership

Dear Friends,

These early days of 2025 are a confusing time for us to compile and share this report with you.

On the one hand, thanks to the unparalleled dedication of AAFSC's team—and supporters like you—we served over 21,000 individuals last year. That's an increase of 25% from the year before and 300% from before the pandemic. You helped us teach over 1,000 students English and prepare 52 of them to become new U.S. citizens. You helped us provide weekly, one-on-one mental health counseling in the languages our clients speak (including Arabic, Bangla, Urdu, and Dari) at no cost to them. And you helped us support over 5,000 individuals and families navigate crises to ensure they stay safe.

On the other hand, immigrants and refugees now face xenophobic rhetoric from our own government leaders. Key strands of the social safety net, which were already fraying, are being cut. The over \$1 million in Federal funds that AAFSC receives annually is now at risk. And mass deportations—no longer merely a threat—have begun. All of this puts incredible strains on the families and individuals AAFSC has been supporting—and on many of our staff members, too.

While we must acknowledge these threats, we must also remember that AAFSC was made for moments like this. Indeed, we have faced moments like these before. In the face of uncertainty, AAFSC is taking concrete steps right now.

We are not just looking for \$1M in new funding annually to replace the Federal funding we expect to lose; we are aiming to expand our mental health, legal support, and community health programs to respond to vastly increasing demand. We have rolled out protocols to help safeguard our staff, clients, and organization as the work of immigrant-serving organizations like AAFSC is under increased scrutiny from our own government. We will continue to make the case for righting historic wrongs by fighting harmful policies that exclude individuals and whole communities and trample on their rights.

The coming year will demand much from all of us. But we draw strength from what we have already accomplished, thanks to you. Your support ensures AAFSC meets this moment and continues to provide the services and advocacy that helps over 21,000 individuals. With you, we can confront these challenges with the strength, clarity, and determination that comes from partnership, and which has always defined AAFSC's work.






